September 3, 2015

We convened at the American International Rattlesnake Museum in Old Town Albuquerque

Scott Bulgrin presided over our meeting which began at 7:12 PM and was attended by 10 guests including a toddler and a child herpers.

Scott asked Cosmos to read the Secretary's Report which were the NMHS Draft Meeting Minutes from August 6, 2015. These were approved and accepted by members present only after our Secretary's confused combination of different reports of legal problems involving 1) a monitor, 2) a Red-footed Tortoise and 3) a Tegu were separated and explained in detail thanks to Josh, Scott and two of our guests, the owners of the Tegu.

Scott asked our Treasurer for the latest financial report. Letitia reported that a balance of \$2,888.43 is in our NMHS checking account. The Treasurer's Report was approved and accepted by members present.

### OLD BUSINESS

August 8 Memorial Tribute to New Mexico Herpetologist Charlie Painter, "Celebrate Charlie," was held at Old Town Farm in Albuquerque. 200 guests were there.

### NMHS Outreach

August 15 and 16 Outdoor Expo was held at Shooting Range Park in far west Albuquerque by our New Mexico Department of Game and Fish. Daniel Carroll and Jerry Tuttle brought their herps. Kevin Halladay of the Department said that 2,000 people came on Saturday, even more on Sunday. The Department had a table with hand-outs including one on legal requirements of importance to herpers.

### NEW BUSINESS

Memorial tribute plaque honoring Charlie Painter. Bob Myers told us that he had ordered the plaque which will be displayed with the New Mexico Milksnake in the American International Rattlesnake Museum.

November 21 and 22 Festival of the Cranes at Socorro, NM in the Visitor's Center. School teacher Lynn Schuler has asked to have a table near NMHS for her MESA (Math Engineering Science Achievement) students display of their bosque biological research.

October 31 Sandia Pueblo Survey. We will close the traps.

November 1 Valle de Oro NWR. We will close the traps.

Scott said that he had gotten a call from a researcher, an ex-Marine, who requested a list of all past Presidents of NMHS. Our Secretary offered to look at past issues of our NMHS Newsletters and come up with that list.

September 5, 6 and 7 NMHS Labor Day Field Trip. We cancelled because of lack of interest.

Patricio Maher had reserved a cabin in Arizona for an outing in the Chiricahua Mountains but cancelled because his daughter Lily had an accident. Our Vice-President Patricio is taking a class on Thursday evenings and will not be at our meetings during the fall semester.

Scott asked Josh to add an "In Rembrance" folder to our website. Scott will ask Lorie for photos of Charlie.

Scott announced that several funds have been set up in Charlie Painter's honor and memory.

NMHS December Banquet. Will it be on December 12<sup>th</sup>? At Church Street Café? Who will be our presenter?

Bill Degenhardt said that we should have a local speaker.

Daniel said he will find out if Brendan O'Connor or Michael Price (of the West Texas Herpetological Society) is interested in presenting at our December Banquet. Scott said that NMHS will pay for the presenter's travel and stipend.

Cosmos suggested that the December Banquet be devoted to a tribute to Bill Degenhardt, complete with photos and audio recordings of his oral history. Letitia suggested that it include a tribute to Ted Brown.

Someone suggested that we ask the new Curator of Reptiles at our BioPark to be the presenter.

Jerry said that he can get Hinkle Famiy Fun Center gift certificates to give away at the display at Bitter Lakes NWR. Jerry and Scott will present at 6:30 PM.

Bosque School in Albuquerque. Jerry said that the survey to be conducted by senior Claire Wilkins, titled "High school students attitude change with the presence of snakes in education programs," will be helped along by a 10-year old girl who is really into handling snakes.
